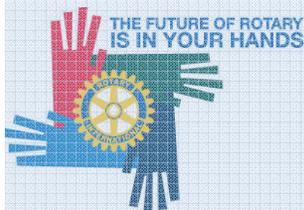

Judy Taylor is now the Minister of All Saints, the Anglican Church in Bodalla,.

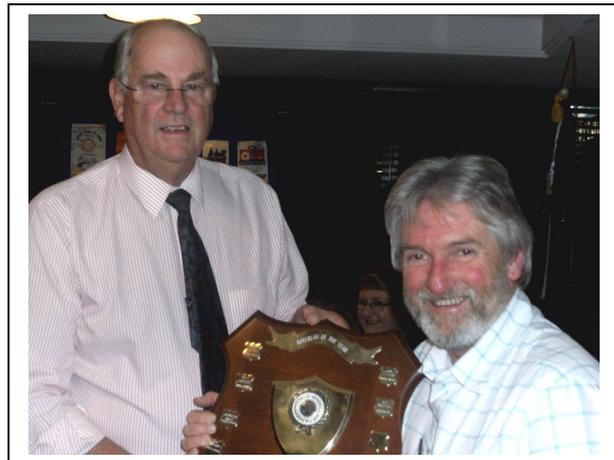
She recounted a journey which started as a Mental Health nurse who slowly became involved in the Church and continues as a Minister.

## ROTARY WORLD PEACE FELLOWS' VISIT AND GALA DINNER

The Rotary World Peace Fellowship is a global initiative of Rotary International. The program funds young professionals competitively selected from around the world to study for a Masters degree in international relations, peace studies, sustainable development and conflict resolution at six specifically established Rotary Centres for Peace and Conflict Resolution. One such centre is based in Australia, at the University of Queensland (UQ).

Our District has been remarkably successful in nominating World Peace Fellows. Since its inception, The Rotary Foundation (TRF) has selected one Fellow from District 9710 every year.

District 9710 has managed to arrange for at least one of the classes of Fellows at UQ to travel to Canberra (at UQ's expense) as a formal part of their curriculum. They will meet people with expertise in Peace and Conflict Resolution subjects, visit the Australian War Memorial and Parliament House, and speak at a formal dinner, the main event of their stay in Canberra.

The dinner is to be held on 12<sup>th</sup> September. Its aim is to promote the Peace and Conflict Resolution program and to raise funds to help meet local costs of the visit (if any) with the balance to go to TRF for funding the program.

The dinner is open to everyone – Rotarians and anyone they know who would be interested to attend and support the program. Watch this space for information about the dinner arrangements.

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Dear Laurelle and Rotary members,

It's been a very busy start to semester two at UNSW. The workload has increased significantly from last semester. Although this has been obviously challenging, I have been really enjoying the subjects that I am taking. Last semester the foundations in mathematics and physics were laid to assist in the subjects that I am undertaking this semester.

The subjects that I am taking include Engineering Mechanics, which involves the analysis of static and dynamic structural members, Maths 1B, which is a continuation from semester one mathematics, Engineering Materials and Chemistry, which looks at the atomic and structural aspects of materials and why they are chosen in civil projects, and Surveying and GIS that provides an introductory look at surveying techniques.

These subjects have been enjoyable as they involve a range of learning mediums including laboratory classes, field exercises and group projects. Assessments occur on a weekly basis for all my subjects and will continue up to the mid-session break in early September.

Again this semester I have tried to balance work with my many sporting endeavours. I am playing soccer on a weekly basis and participating in weekend gala days for other sports. I continue to enjoy living at college. I have found it to be a huge advantage for both social and academic purposes. I always have many outlets when I need assistance with my course work and regular social events are organised that I enjoy participating in.
