

It was a busy weekend with the District 9710 Conference on at Batemans Bay/ Moruya was well as our usual Narooma Rotary Market on Sunday.

The Back to the Beach Conference was fantastic – Congratulations to DG Phil and his dedicated organising committee – The Services Club looked resplendent in its beach theme and the speakers were entertaining and thought provoking.

Saturday morning started off with a great rendition of *Advance Australia Fair* by our very own Merinda Antill followed by a heartfelt Welcome to Country by Muriel Slokee. Our Rotary Youth Exchange Students then completed the parade of national flags.




