## *Rotary in Lebanon (From the RI Website)*

Lebanon's Rotary, Rotaract, and Inner Wheel clubs were transformed into an impressive corps of volunteers that provided much needed emergency relief to tens of thousands of displaced residents during a month of fighting.

As soon as the Israeli-Hezbollah conflict broke out mid-July, clubs in the less vulnerable areas set up committees to collect, purchase, and distribute relief supplies for refugees seeking safer havens.

"We met daily to assess the situation and plan how to address the needs of refugees," says Ronald Farra, of the Rotary Club of Baabda in Beirut. "We contributed our own money and accepted donations to buy food, medicine, and other relief packages."

Rotarians and Rotaractors exchanged news and situation reports and coordinated their humanitarian activities by e-mail, telephone, or word-of-mouth where the telecommunication infrastructure was destroyed.

To better synchronize their efforts, more than 100 participants representing all but two of the country's 20 Rotary clubs and 15 Rotaract clubs met in Beirut on 1 August. They set up a national relief committee and a bank account to receive donations.

According to Michel Jassar, of the Rotary Club of Zgharta-Zawié, the outpouring of support from Rotary clubs all over RI District 2450 and the rest of the world greatly encouraged and cheered up local Rotarians.

For example, Rotarians in Amman, Jordan, rushed 350 kidney dialysis filters to Beirut. Rotary clubs in Bahrain and Dubai in the United Arab Emirates raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for emergency relief supplies, and Rotary clubs in Cyprus and Egypt sent shipments of relief supplies to Lebanon.

"Their understanding, contributions, and messages of support kept us going," he says. "We need to explain to all Rotarians that the refugees will need more help as they return to their homes."

In its latest meeting, the emergency relief committee of the clubs in Lebanon decided to assess the needs of displaced people returning to the most devastated areas in the south and east of the country. Dealing with trauma will be a huge responsibility, Farra points out. So will the rebuilding of medical facilities, schools, and even the social fabric that has made Lebanon a multireligious community.

"It is not possible for us to match what bigger organizations like the Red Cross and UN are doing," he says. "But we can help. For example, we can repair houses, do cleanups, or provide small loans for individuals in villages that are not serviced by these organizations."

According to Christine Arzoumanian, president of the Rotaract Club of Beirut Cosmopolitan, such postconflict support includes helping local businesses reopen so residents can return to work.

"We are doing our best," she says. "No matter what happens in the future, we want to keep the spirit of Rotary alive in Lebanon."
