A GSE team from the Netherlands was scheduled to visit Indonesia shortly after the tsunami disaster of December 2004. The team members were aware of the damage that had occurred in their host district and embarked on a mission - to return home with a project that would benefit tsunami victims. During their visit they discovered that many Acehnese students could no longer pursue their studies because they had lost homes and families in the tsunami. The GSE team leader launched an appeal to Dutch Rotary clubs who, through the Rotary Club of Bandung in Indonesia, were able to identify deserving Acehnese students needing assistance to complete their study programs.
