From the International Director

In his Fines session last week, Jeremy drew our attention to the article "ShelterBoxes Ready to Go" in *Rotary Down Under*. It reported that 220 ShelterBoxes purchased with funds donated by Australian clubs had been stored in Melbourne ready for deployment where needed in our region. It noted that a storage facility for 'instant response' will also be located in Indonesia.

ShelterBox Australia's News Update of 15th October reported the delivery of aid to three countries, with ShelterBox Response Teams sent on each deployment to ensure it reaches the neediest people. 400 tents were sent to Peru in response to the earthquake that occurred in August, 100 ShelterBoxes were sent to Uganda where torrential rains have devastated the country's Teso region, and 230 boxes have been delivered to Somaliland to aid families displaced by years of civil war.

The leader of the first ShelterBox Response Team to Peru said, *"The scale of disaster warrants a substantially bigger international response. When we were there, we saw hardly any signs of Western aid and didn't bump into any other Western aid workers. It is an absolutely appalling tragedy to see a disaster of this magnitude and barely a sign of aid other than ShelterBox."*

The Funny Side

What Gender is a Computer?

A SPANISH Teacher was explaining to her class that in Spanish, unlike English, nouns are designated as either masculine or feminine.

"House" for instance, is feminine: "la casa."

"Pencil," however, is masculine: "el lapiz."

A student asked, "What gender is 'computer'?"

Instead of giving the answer, the teacher split the class into two groups, male and female, and asked them to decide for themselves whether "computer" should be a masculine or a feminine noun.

Each group was asked to give four reasons for its recommendation.

The men's group decided that "computer" should definitely be of the feminine gender ("la computadora"), because:

1. No one but their creator understands their internal logic;
2. The native language they use to communicate with other computers are incomprehensible to everyone else;
3. Even the smallest mistakes are stored in long term memory for possible later retrieval; and
4. As soon as you make a commitment to one, you find yourself spending half your pay cheque on accessories for it.

The women's group, however, concluded that computers should be Masculine ("el computador"), because:

1. In order to do anything with them, you have to turn them on;
2. They have a lot of data but still can't think for themselves;
3. They are supposed to help you solve problems, but half the time they ARE the problem; and
4. As soon as you commit to one, you realize that if you had waited a little longer, you could have gotten a better model.

A Puzzle- The answer

Surprising as it may seem the first day of a century can never occur on a Sunday, a Tuesday or a Thursday. In 1582 to improve the accuracy of the calendar, Pope Gregory XIII decreed that instead of every fourth year being a leap year an exception would be made for centurial years not being divisible by 400. Thus 2000 was a leap year but the years 2100, 2200 and 2300 will not be.

To see what effect this has on century days consider the number of days from January 1 on one century to January 1 in the next century. There are 100 years which would normally contain 25 years and hence 36525 days which is equivalent to 5217 weeks and 6 days. Thus from one century to the next without Pope Gregory's adjustment, the weekday would move by 6. However this only happens when a century day follows on from a century divisible by 400. When this is not the case there will only be 24 leap years in the intervening century so the day will move on by 5!

The century day in 2000 was a Saturday. In 2100 it will be a Friday (plus 6 days), 2200 it will be a Wednesday (plus 5 days), 2300 it will be a Monday (plus 5 days), 2400 it will be a Saturday (plus 5 days) and 2500 a Friday (plus 6 days).
