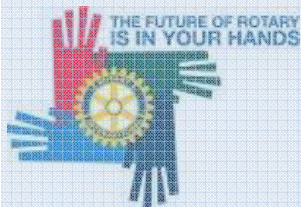

JACK'S JOURNAL

Still missed Marilyn and Max last week (on leave – so is Ted but he's gone away), and Ian and Jeremy (away interstate but not for long). Also missed Bob Aston, Kris and Angie. Had the pleasure of the company of Honorary Member Pam and guests Isy Gabriel (High School P&C Association President) and PE Bob Reid of RC Upper Blue Mountains Sunrise who was accompanied by his partner Irene and Club Secretary Helen Audsley.

Bob's after-dinner talk was pertinent to our fundraising from the food van. With a purpose-built trailer and three members with catering expertise, his club has developed a very profitable fund-raising undertaking. Evidently they get a lot of their supplies donated, probably for events that are to raise funds for specified causes. Camp Quality is a direct beneficiary of their culinary efforts as they provide the meals for the children attending.

We rely very much on the P&C Association of Narooma High School for manning the food van at our monthly markets. It is a fundraising venture for them as well, and our arrangement is to share the profits from sales less all expenses attributable to van operations. Isy Gabriel was pleased to receive \$2,300 from us for the P&C as their share for the six months June to November.

On Sunday, together with Bob Aston, I was privileged to present a cheque for \$2,000 to the Cycleway Fundraising Committee's Secretary Sue Liddy. The donation was funded largely from the proceeds of the bike-a-thon and special market held last month... And we were able to show appreciation for the assistance given to the bike-a-thon by St John Ambulance by handing a cheque for \$500 to their Publicity Officer Janni Thompson. Next in line for recognition is the VRA whose help with providing marshals for the bike-a-thon was vital to its success. They will receive \$1,000.

Each of us in membership is classified differently according to our business or profession, the idea being to have a representative cross section of the community in the club. During his talk last week, Bob Reid mentioned that his club had obtained five new members as a result of doing a classification survey and mailing out a letter to prospects. A classification survey is based on a listing of business and professional classifications not represented in the club to which can be added the names of persons known to be engaged in those businesses or professions, thus identifying prospective members. Such a list is a logical basis for club growth, and it was used as the basis for establishing the charter membership of our club in 1958.

At this week's meeting we shall do a classification survey of the community. Although it cannot cover all categories (it's just not practicable to replicate the Yellow Pages), we should be able to identify "persons of interest" and direct our recruiting efforts accordingly. We should also consider why, in some instances, our efforts to recruit and retain members have not been successful.

At the club forum on membership recruitment and retention next week we shall consider how best to approach those identified in the classification survey, and what prospective members and new members need to be told about the club and Rotary at the introductory stage.

Do we need a dry run for the Cinders challenge? I don't think so, but note that it is a partner's night and this is one occasion when we cannot do without them.
