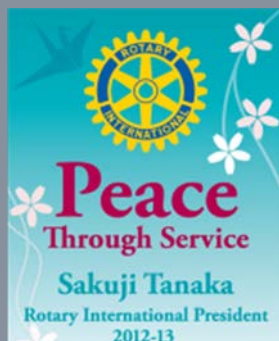

On Sunday morning we woke to the news that Neil Armstrong had died. I remember the day Neil Armstrong walked on the moon as if it was yesterday. I was a 13 year old in my first year of high school. Television sets were rolled into each classroom of the school and every student sat down in front of the grainy black and white screen and watched the events unfold. If I remember correctly we just sat there for the whole day, none of us mucked up or got bored, we just watched with amazement Armstrong jumped on to the moon's surface at around 1:00pm on 21 July 1969 and uttered those now famous words, 'That's one small step for [a] man, one giant leap for mankind.'
