**Thursday 11 June 2015: Steve Ross' talk: Lawyering and Country Advocacy**



Steve, lawyer and community advocate with a big heart, from Cobargo, had us spellbound with his eloquent talk last night and it was generally agreed to print most of his talk – which I will precis as it covers five pages. He is also Dad to Connor Ross, one of our Tertiary Scholarship holders and shared news from him.

He chose to speak about the delivery of legal services, taking a different approach and perhaps a bit controversial. Steve was strongly influenced by his paternal grandfather whose life is well documented as a political activist in Sydney, a trade unionist, leader in the Worker's Education Association movement, an academic and bureaucrat heading a Department in the Curtin and Chifley governments. He was a much sought after guest speaker at Rotary Clubs.

"I know he had two guiding principles. The first was he believed in a more just and fairer world and the idea of service. His life was a life of service and I know that many of you here also see the importance of service in your lives.

We live in a complex democracy and this weekend marks the 800 anniversary of the Magna Carta....A crucial aspect of it is that justice will be done by following rules that have been stated in advance and are

... The aspect of the rule of law that I wish to emphasise is participation in decision-making. This of course is also at the core of democracy. ... In my view, this means all people have the means to be involved and participate in decision-making of the organisations and structures that affect their daily lives. In order to do this they need to have their material needs met, housing shelter, food, education and be able to live a life free of fear discrimination and violence and justice. They also need in my view, to be able to have the opportunity to appreciate and to produce beautiful things.”

Early on Steve worked in community services assisting unemployed youth engage in activities giving them a sense of self worth and purpose. It became apparent to him that services to the distressed had to be delivered by properly trained and remunerated staff in sufficient numbers. This led him to be active in the social welfare workers union. Realising his own skills and knowledge were inadequate to assist people, he completed a degree in communications. He met Suzy his wife and both worked in the area of medium term housing, particularly women seeking refuge from violence. Both were involved in the establishment of a tenants' advice and housing referral service in NSW. “Many of us who worked in the area had the view that in order to provide an appropriate level of service we firstly had to be active politically, to seek to change certain laws and policy that had a direct impact on those people. ... We had to empower the people we were working with to feel comfortable participating in the decisions affecting their daily lives and significantly that we had to ensure that the physical spaces that we worked in and saw our clients were not just comfortable but also beautiful spaces to be in. This ultimately led Steve to do a Masters in Industrial Relations at Sydney University.

Later, moving to Brisbane both continued their work helping the marginalised and Steve commenced his Law degree studying externally through Macquarie University. At age 40, he was admitted as a solicitor working in private practice and in addition to Industrial law, also worked in Criminal law and Mental health and Guardianship law.

They moved to Cobargo 6 years ago and established Sapphire Mediated Resolutions including generalist legal services and are very involved in the community and arts.

***...”In conclusion, it is my view that living in a complex and diverse democratic society is a good thing. The more just and equitable and the more that everybody is able to participate in that complex and diverse democratic society, then the better it gets for us all. We both find it extremely difficult to see people in circumstances where they are denied the opportunity for whatever reason to participate in our society, and so our concept of service is to work to enable and empower people to overcome those circumstances. Essential to that process is the creation and pursuit of beauty and justice.”***
